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Playing Good, Better, Best

- 1. Explain to the children that you are going to give them some scenarios and possible solutions.
- 2. Explain that the children will have to choose which solutions are good, better and best.

Scenario 1

You are helping your mom clean up from dinner. A friend calls and asks if you can play.

- a. Ask your mom if you can go play.
- b. Ask your mom if you can go play after you finish cleaning up from dinner.
- c. Tell your mom you are going out to play.
- d. Tell your friend you will call back after you finish cleaning up and after you ask your mom.

Scenario 2

A kid on your soccer team says mean things to everyone on his/her own team.

- a. Tell your coach about it.
- b. Say mean things back to the kid. Then he will know how it feels.
- c. Ask the kid to stop saying mean things to everyone.
- d. Make an extra effort at saying nice things to your teammates. Maybe the mean kid will catch on.

Scenario 3

You notice a classmate picking-on another classmate.

- a. Tell the principal.
- b. Ask the kid to stop picking on people.
- c. Tell the kid who is being picked-on that you will be a friend.
- d. Join the kid who is picking-on people so that you don't get picked-on.

Scenario 4

Older kids on the bus tease younger kids on the bus.

- a. Tell the bus driver
- b. Tell the principal.
- c. Sit far away from the older kids.
- d. Try to think of something to say back to the older kids.
